cultivate a thriving Muslim civilization it is essential to rediscover an ethical framework for disagreement. Al-Alwani defines this as a constructive approach to discourse and debate that prioritizes mutual respect, understanding, and tolerance among individuals with differing viewpoints.

The book illustrates how early prominent Muslim scholars set the standard, viewing disagreement not as a source of division, but as an opportunity for dialogue and intellectual growth, recognizing the validity of differing opinions whilst striving for common ground.

Al-Alwani also points to practices of dispute resolution that wisely steered discourse from positional and defensive argumentation to collaborative and constructive engagement. Prioritizing exploration of ideas without confrontational exchange is the great legacy of the past that Al-Alwani passionately calls contemporary Muslims to revive today.


